the Holy Ghost speak them to your own heart. One point of note I will mention is that **Titus** is requested here by the Apostle Paul to encourage Saints from A to Z as he brings them on their Christian journey. This gives a little better glimpse as to the character of **Titus**, and his ministry. He got to minister to everyone, including some high profile Saints, and no doubt he was a great encouragement to them as he further expounded Paul's gospel message. Let's look at these men in the order we find them mentioned here in scripture.

(8) Artemas

Artemas is the eighth person of the thirty-four people mentioned by name in Paul's last three epistles. All we know of Artemas is found in this one scripture of TITUS 3:12 When I shall send Artemas unto thee, or Tychicus, be diligent to come unto me to Nicopolis: for I have determined there to winter. On the surface this doesn't seem like much information, yet there is considerable information divulged here. Obviously Paul knew Artemas, and he was on Paul's short list of preachers or teachers who could replace Titus at Crete. Recall from TITUS 1:5 that Paul had left Titus in Crete for the purpose of setting in order the things that were lacking previously in the Christian churches already established in Crete. ACTS 2:11 tells that there were Cretes in Jerusalem on the day of Pentecost who heard the disciples speak in other tongues, and in the languages of those present the wonderful works of God. Peter went on to preach his first Holy Ghost inspired sermon to these very same people, and approximately three thousand souls were saved that day. Among them no doubt were those from Crete. How Christian churches were established in Crete we are not further told in scripture, yet the Apostle Paul and Titus had most recently been there. Titus was still there when Paul wrote Titus. Perhaps Paul too had established a church or two in Crete. At one point in time Paul in ACTS 27 was anchored off the coast of Crete, but that great storm of ACTS 27 prevented him from setting foot on shore there at that time. Now several years later Paul and Titus had been there. Apparently Paul's time in Crete was very brief, and that is why he left **Titus** there, to further set in proper order the things that were missing in these Christian churches of Crete. However Paul also felt that it was more important for **Titus** to be with him during the winter when Paul would be preaching in Nicopolis, a city on the west coast of Greece on the coast of the Ionian Sea. On a map it is between Athens, and Rome, about three hundred miles NNW of Crete, and about one hundred fifty miles WNW of Corinth. Note also in TITUS 3:13 above that Titus was not left alone in Crete, for Paul had requested Titus to bring with him Zenas the lawyer and Apollos, highly esteemed Saints in their own right who apparently had already been preaching on the island of Crete. More on **Zenas** the lawyer and **Apollos** shortly.

So we find in TITUS 3:12 that Paul had Artemas on his short list of qualified people, who could replace Titus on Crete. Artemas means "safe and sound" according to J. B. Jackson's Dictionary of Scripture proper Names. And apparently Paul felt that those of Crete would be "safe and sound" in the care of Artemas. Where Artemas came from we are not told in scripture, nor do we known when he met Paul, or how it was he came to know Jesus Christ as his own personal Saviour. That is just one of those testimonies we will have to wait to hear until we get to heaven. Obviously Artemas was highly thought of by Paul, and perhaps Paul had spent much time with Artemas, but again we don't know for the scripture does not record any more information on Artemas than we have in this one verse of TITUS 3:12. Some say Artemas afterwards became bishop of Lystra, but the fact of this remains uncertain. Apparently Artemas was a common name of Greek origin. Obviously Titus too knew Artemas, and Paul and Titus must have spent some time together with him also. We wish we could connect the dots between them a little better, but we cannot with the little information we have of Artemas in scripture.

(9) Tychicus

The next person found in our list of the thirty-four names mentioned in Paul's last three epistles is Tychicus, a man we have discussed much about before. {Review pages 1189-1197 of these notes.} He is mentioned twice in Paul's final three epistles, once here in TITUS 3:12, and again in 2 TIMOTHY 4:12. Tychicus is mentioned by name five different times in scripture all together starting chronologically back in ACTS 20:4 as part of the so called faithful seven who traveled with Paul from Asia to Jerusalem on Paul's final visit to Jerusalem. In ACTS 20:5 Tychicus was noted as being of Asia, meaning that he probably was among those Paul ministered unto in Ephesus, and continued faithfully following Paul until the end of his life. However we found that nothing more was written concerning Tychicus until Paul was in prison in Rome. Tychicus was one of the ten we know who took the time to travel to Rome, and diligently seek out Paul until he found him. From his cell in Rome Paul wrote his high water mark epistle unto the Ephesians, where he writes the following concerning Tychicus: EPHESIANS 6:21 But that ye also may know my affairs, and how I do, Tychicus, a beloved brother and faithful minister in the Lord, shall make known to you all things: 22 Whom I have sent unto you for the same purpose, that ye might know our affairs, and that he might comfort your hearts. Paul entrusted the safe delivery of the EPHESIANS letter in the hands of Tychicus knowing that Tychicus would be able to make known Paul's current state of affairs, and how he was doing while being held prisoner in Rome. Further Paul noted that **Tychicus** would also be able to comfort the hearts of those at Ephesus concerning his current state. Thus we noted how close a confidant to Paul, Tychicus was in order to know about all of Paul's affairs, and how Paul was really doing while being held a prisoner in Rome. We also found that while in prison at Rome Paul wrote of Tychicus again in COLOSSIANS 4:7, where we find Paul saying that **Tychicus** ... is a beloved brother, and a faithful minister and fellowservant in the Lord:... We here find that Paul and Tychicus were like-minded faithful ministers, and fellowservants in the Lord. Paul also sent Tychicus to Colosse with Paul's letter written unto them. Perhaps Tychicus also carried with him Paul's writings to the Laodiceans, however scripture doesn't specifically tell us this. We do know from COLOSSIANS 4 that Tychicus didn't go to these places alone. COLOSSIANS 4:7 All my state shall Tychicus declare unto you, who is a beloved brother, and a faithful minister and fellowservant in the Lord: 8 Whom I have sent unto you for the same purpose, that he might know your estate, and comfort your hearts; 9 With Onesimus, a faithful and beloved brother, who is one of you. They shall make known unto you all things which are done here. We find here that Paul sent Tychicus to Ephesus, and Colosse with this new brother in the Lord, Onesimus, whom Tychicus could continue to encourage, and minister to, and fellowship with in the Lord as they made this lengthy journey from Rome to Paul's Asia. The Lord saw to it that **Tychicus**, this ... faithful minister in the Lord,... always had someone to minister unto; to fellowship with; to encourage in the Lord. On the journey to Ephesus and Colosse Tychicus' traveling companion was Onesimus, who was also a show-and-tell evidence (especially to those of Colosse) as to the current state of Paul's ministry. Furthermore at the same time Onesimus was carrying a letter from Paul to Philemon, and no doubt Tychicus was with Onesimus when he delivered this letter, which would explain why Tychicus' name isn't found in PHILEMON.

Think about these epistles of EPHESIANS, COLOSSIANS, and PHILEMON for a moment. How do you suppose **Tychicus** and Onesimus delivered them? Probably not like we think. The letter to the EPHESIANS was written to Saints Paul knew. **Tychicus** (we think) was from Ephesus, so he too knew these very same people. Perhaps **Tychicus** and Onesimus both also knew those in Colosse. We know that Onesimus well knew Philemon, his master. **Tychicus** and Onesimus didn't just drop off these letters like a piece of mail, and then move on. Note how Paul wanted these epistles to be read in COLOSSIANS 4:16 And when this epistle is read among you, cause that it be read also in the church of the Laodiceans; and that ye likewise read the epistle from Laodicea. This means that these letters were to be read publicly. **Tychicus** was ...a faithful minister and

fellowservant in the Lord,... and I am certain that he personally read these epistles unto these assemblies. It would be hard to just read these letters without further expounding, and thus preaching from them. A Saint from Ephesus for example would recognize Paul's language, and Paul's teaching here, and with these lofty thoughts written down for them, certainly they would all want their own copy of Paul's "letter." Thus we get a better picture of just how it was that **Tychicus** was ...a faithful minister and fellowservant in the Lord,... He was more than a mail man. He was familiar with the contents of these letters, and knew how to further expound Paul's teaching, and with the help and power of the Holy Ghost he could emphasize the lofty thoughts Paul had written unto these Saints. Tychicus could relay the many hours of conversations that he and Paul had discussing these very same topics that Paul had now written down in his letters to the EPHESIANS, and to the COLOSSIANS. PHILEMON was a personal letter written unto one man, Philemon. This letter was treasured so much by PHILEMON that it was shared, and preserved for us today. A changed Onesimus was further evidence of the profound effect that the Lord has in the life of a Holy Spirit filled believer, which change was greatly appreciated, and enjoyed by Philemon. The point of noting all of this is to shed more light on the statement we read in COLOSSIANS 4:7 All my state shall Tychicus declare unto you, who is a beloved brother, and a faithful minister and fellowservant in the Lord:... Obviously Tychicus was well grounded in the truth that Paul taught and preached in order to properly and publicly declare the contents of these epistles he was given to deliver.

Both portions of scripture we read above from EPHESIANS 6:22 and COLOSSIANS 4:8 note that **Tychicus** would be able to ...comfort your hearts... . No doubt **Tychicus** was a great comfort also to the heart of Paul. Some how after Paul's release from prison at Rome, Paul again met up with **Tychicus**. No doubt this happened during the time frame when Paul was at Ephesus as noted in 1 TIMOTHY 1:3. **Tychicus** it seems may have traveled from Ephesus with Paul when Paul left **Timothy** in charge at Ephesus. It also seems that **Titus** was with Paul too as Paul visited Crete, where he now has left **Titus**. Obviously **Tychicus** and **Titus** knew each other, for again Paul writes **Titus** in TITUS 3:12 When I shall send Artemas unto thee, or **Tychicus**, be diligent to come unto me to Nicopolis: for I have determined there to winter. Perhaps all four of these, Paul, **Titus**, Artemas and **Tychicus** had recently traveled together, for Paul writes this as if they all knew each other, which certainly they did.

2 TIMOTHY 4:12 records the last mention of **Tychicus** in scripture: And **Tychicus** have I sent to Ephesus. With the information we have studied above it is little wonder that Paul has now once again sent **Tychicus** back to Ephesus. Perhaps it was **Artemas** that Paul sent to Crete to retrieve **Titus**, meaning that **Tychicus** continued to travel with Paul even to Rome once again, where Paul was writing **Timothy** from prison. Perhaps it was **Tychicus** who rushed the letter of 2 TIMOTHY back to **Timothy** in Ephesus, but once again we will have to wait until we get to heaven to know the answer as to who carried this letter back to **Timothy**. One thing we know for certain about **Tychicus**, he was ...a beloved brother and faithful minister in the Lord... as Paul noted without hesitation in EPHESIANS 6:12 and COLOSSIANS 4:7. May these very same qualities be found in each of us as we too follow Paul as he followed Christ. **Tychicus** was this kind of faithful follower of Christ.

(10) Zenas and (11) Apollos

Number ten on our list of the thirty-four people mentioned by name in Paul's last three epistles is **Zenas** the lawyer found only one time in scripture, TITUS 3:13 Bring Zenas the lawyer and Apollos on their journey diligently, that nothing be wanting unto them. Obviously Apollos is number eleven on the list, and is found here with **Zenas** the lawyer. Since **Zenas** is only found in this one scripture we cannot tell if he was a Jewish lawyer, a Greek lawyer, or a Roman lawyer. If he were a Jewish lawyer, he could have been a scribe, and an interpreter of Moses law among the Jews. If he was a Roman or Greek lawyer he would have most likely been familiar with the civil
